TRANSPORTATION FROM THE AIRPORT TO THE FOUR SEASONS

The Four Seasons is located in Downtown Vancouver – a short walk to Robson Square. It is approximately 20-25 minutes to travel from the Vancouver International Airport to the Four Seasons by taxi. We would recommend taking a taxi or using the train, however, if you are renting a car, please find directions below.

TRANSPORTATION FROM THE FOUR SEASONS TO ROBSON SQUARE

To Robson Square at the University of British Columbia

The Four Seasons Hotel is approximately a 3 to 4 minute walk to Robson Square.

- 1. Exit the Hotel and onto Howe St.
- Head southwest on Howe St.
- 3. Turn right on Robson St.
- 4. Robson Square will be on the left

Conference Tour

Museum of Anthropology at the University of British Columbia - Tuesday, 21 February 2012 6:30-8:00PM

The Setting

The Museum is located on the traditional territory of the Musqueam First Nation. The Musqueam (which means "river grass") and their ancestors have occupied the point of land on which the Museum and University are built for over 9000 years.

The Architecture

Designed by world-renowned architect, Arthur Erickson, the Museum is known for its soaring glass windows and spectacular setting overlooking mountains and sea. Erickson took his inspiration for the building from traditional northern Northwest Coast 19th century post-and-beam style architecture.

The Collection

MOA houses approximately 37,000 ethnological objects and 535,000 archaeological objects. These include historic and contemporary collections from around the world – Asia, Africa, Europe, Oceania, South and Central America and of course, the Northwest Coast (largest collection at MOA in the world). The Koerner Ceramics Gallery contains over 600 pieces of 16th – 19th century European ceramics as well as extraordinary contemporary works. From towering totem poles to textiles to exquisite examples of Greek and Roman jewelry in gold and other precious metals, we have it all!

The Great Hall

This magnificent space showcases full-size totem poles from many different First Nations in BC. The tallest is 15 meters high – as high as the glass walls for which the Museum is famous. Frequently, the site of events staged by artists from all over the worlds, the Great Hall has also been visited by such luminaries as Prince Charles, Bill Clinton (twice!) and Boris Yeltsin.

The Haida Houses

From the Great Hall inside MOA, you can see two full-size Haida Houses outside the Museum, surrounded by a forest of soaring totem poles. These houses were built in 1962 under the supervision of Haida artist, Bill Reid, and Namgis artist, Doug Cranmer. They replicate the bighouses common to the Northwest Coast in the 19th century.

The Raven and the First Men

This sculpture by Haida artist, Bill Reid, is one of the most famous carvings in the world (it even appears on the Canadian \$20 bill). It depicts the figure of Raven discovering the first Haida humans, and coaxing them out of their protective clamshell. Carved from a massive block of 106 laminated yellow cedar planks, the sculpture rests on a bed of sand brought to the Museum in 1980 by children from the village of Haida Gwaii where this event is said to have taken place."

The tour will meet at the museum and be about 90 minutes long. You are welcome to stay at the museum until closing at 9:00PM
